GaDOE recognizes LVP as Reward School

This month, the Georgia Department of Education recognized schools deemed as 2023-24 Reward Schools. The Reward School designation recognizes Title I schools "making the most significant improvements," according to a press release.

According to the press release, Reward Schools are among the greatest-improving 5% of Title I Schoolwide and Title I Targeted Assistance schools when comparing the content mastery scores from the 2021-22 and 2022-23 results of statewide assessments. Lakeview Primary represented Baldwin County on the list.

"The Title I Distinguished and Reward Schools have made significant efforts to overcome barriers, meet challenges, and produce great gains for their students," State School Superintendent Richard Woods said in the press release. "Together, these schools prove that with collaboration, innovation, and a commitment to success, all students can achieve their fullest potential."

Lakeview Primary Principal Dr. Tracy Clark said the biggest honor of receiving the title was being able to show the hard work of the school.

"That hard work goes to our third-grade teachers at Lakeview Academy," said Clark. "That's where our score comes from. Our schools have worked hard to prepare students and being named a Reward School shows

Seorgia college Online masters programs at GCSU ranked among best

Georgia College & State University's (GCSU) online master's programs were ranked among the top 100 in the country, and among the top five in Georgia, in *U.S. News* & *World Report's* 2025 rankings.

The university's masters degree in nursing ranked No. 1 in Georgia and tied for No. 17 in the country, among both public and private institutions.

GCSU's online masters degrees in criminal justice and business ranked highly, as well, each earning the distinction of being ranked No. 2 in Georgia in their respective categories. The Master of Business Administration program ranked No. 4 in Georgia, and the masters degree in education tied for the fifth-best program of its kind in the state, along with Kennesaw State University and Georgia Southern University.

"These top rankings in online education reflect Georgia College & State University's unwavering commitment to the student experience," said Georgia College President Cathy Cox. "Through our 32 different graduate programs, our faculty members strive to offer students unique and meaningful learning opportunities that prepare them to step into or advance in dynamic careers. Construction underway on county pickleball courts

After requests from the community and an explosion in popularity of the sport, Baldwin County will soon welcome 20 brand-new pickleball courts.

The new courts will be open this spring at Walter B. Williams Park.

This project will nearly quadruple the number of public

pickleball courts in Baldwin County, adding to the eight courts already located at the same park. This addition to the park will create 28 total pickleball courts, highlighting the sports rapid rise in popularity.

County Manager Carlos Tobar is excited for what this brings to the Milledgeville and Baldwin County community.

"Back in 2023, during the comprehensive planning phase,

there was a survey of Baldwin County residents, and the number-one request was for more recreational opportunities," Tobar said. "We are very excited to deliver these pickleball courts and other projects and opportunities to our residents."

The total budget for the project is \$1,805,191. After initially being rejected for an Economic Development Assistance (EDA) grant, new grants became available. The project is funded by three American Rescue Plan Act Park grants, which are aimed at helping disproportionately impacted communities. The site of the new courts qualified for the assistance.

The pickleball courts will be situated right next to Milledgeville's upcoming water park, another important addition to the park. The new courts will also house their own pavilion, providing players with event space and seats for relaxation. According to Tobar, construction on the pickleball courts should be completed by late March or early April.

The new pickleball courts are one of eight recreational projects coming to Baldwin County and Milledgeville in 2025.

Robbie King, the new president and CEO of the Eatonton-Putnam Chamber of Commerce. will be one of two keynote speakers at Georgia Writers Museum's Writers Retreat: Write on the Lake. Scheduled for Feb. 21-23, the retreat will take place at the museum, beginning with a 4 p.m. cocktail reception on Friday, and wrapping up early Sunday afternoon.

King will speak on "The Role of AI for Writers,' exploring how artificial intelligence can be a valuable tool for authors in their creative and professional pursuits.

AI and its use have sparked heated debate among writers in recent years. The 2023 Writers Guild of America strike

highlighted these concerns, as one of the demands was to limit AI to roles like research assistance or idea generation rather than as a replacement for screenwriters. Similarly, prominent authors, including John Grisham, recently filed a lawsuit against OpenAI, alleging unauthorized use

of their work to train AI systems like ChatGPT. King's keynote speech

will focus on the positive side of AI, describing how it may enhance an author's creative process. He will share practical insights on using AI to overcome writer's block, develop chapter outlines, suggest narrative structures, and refine story pacing. He also will discuss how AI can assist with character development, plot twists, and deep research, serving

as a powerful tool for authors at any stage of their journeys.

A seasoned business leader and communicator, King holds a B.S. from North Carolina State University. His telecom career spans over 25 years, with leadership roles at Coastal Communications and Comcast Business, where he retired in 2015 as regional director of business services.

Following retirement, King launched a successful management consulting practice specializing in business start-up, strategy, and communication skills.

After relocating to Lake Country with his wife, Marsha, King founded and continues to host "Lure of the Lake," a popular podcast highlighting inspiring stories of Lake Country residents. He is also known for presenting engaging workshops on integrating AI into daily tasks, business processes, and creative projects.






