

## Students to present research on building community

Georgia College professor Amy Johnson is partnering with Allied Arts to host the "Public Life, Public Space" exhibit April 30, which will feature four research presentations by student teams in her Ethnographic Methods class.

"Ethnography is a method that anthropologists use to study how people's everyday life is made meaningful for them. We look deeply into practices, activities,

ways of talking and interacting with other people," said Johnson. Through those different actions, we discern what is important to the community and that particular place."

Nineteen students were split into four teams to study how public spaces facilitate community-building for Milledgeville residents. The sites they studied include the Oconee River Greenway, Walter B. Williams and City Parks, different branches of the Mary Vinson Public Library,

and downtown Milledgeville.

"The results show different dimensions of community-building that occur within and across these spaces, pointing toward the continued importance of public space for increasing meaningful social interactions among Milledgeville residents,"

said Johnson. This was Johnson's first year teaching the class, as she began teaching at Georgia College in

### USG not increasing tuition for in-state students

For the seventh time in the last 10 years, the University System of Georgia (USG) Board of Regents voted Tuesday to hold the line on tuition for in-state students.

Since 2016, tuition at the state's 26 public colleges and universities has increased by less than 1% per year, Tracey Cook, the system's chief fiscal officer, told the regents at a meeting on the campus of Georgia Southern University in Statesboro.

"USG and the Board of Regents remain focused on keeping college affordable for Georgia families to ensure higher education stays within reach across the state," system Chancellor Sonny Perdue said. "As more students than ever enroll on our campuses, we

continue to prioritize reducing financial barriers and offering excellent value.

Among the 16 Southern Regional Education Board states, Georgia is third lowest in average undergraduate tuition and required fees compared to its public peers,

according to national data from the College Board. Nationally, the system has the sixth-lowest tuition and fees.

The regents did raise tuition for in-state undergraduates by 2.5% last year. Perdue cited

## JMA baseball scores two wins at home

The John Milledge Academy (JMA) varsity baseball team scored a 5-4 victory over Tatnall Square Academy (TSA) in Milledgeville on April 17, then beat Vidalia Heritage Academy 7-2 on Monday as it nears the end of its 2025 regular season.

The wins brought the Trojans to a 16-6 overall record and ranked them 3rd in GIAA 3A/4A with a 3-3 in-region record. Four region matchups remain on JMA's regular-season schedule.

The Trojans' path to victory over TSA began with a slow start as they first inning, trailing the visitors by two runs.

JMA got on the board with one run in the second inning before taking over the lead with a two-run homer in the third inning. After adding another two-run shot over the wall in the fourth, the game went scoreless until TSA scored twice in the top of the seventh to reach the final result.

According to Trojans head coach Justin Mills, the home runs by senior Asa Wall and freshman Avden Whidby were massive moments in their baseball careers. Whidby made the first home run "in his life," Mills said, while Wall scored the first

Significantly, JMA's one-run victory also

offered payback after the Trojans suffered a 10-0 loss to Tatnall Square in Macon just two days earlier.

Afterward, Mills spoke on the team's progress in the game and throughout the 2025 season.

"A lot of big things happened [during the game,]" Mills said. "I was really proud of the team effort for sure." Mills added that he

In addition to Wall and Whidby, several other team members contributed to Thursday's victory, Mills said, including senior pitcher Kolt McMichael, who helped lead the team with one run, two hits, and seven strikeouts.

'Kolt McMichael was a bulldog on the mound, and I was proud to see that," Mills said. "He's had a good year."

With tight competition throughout the game,

inflation at the time. The coming school year will see a 2% tuition increase for out-ofstate students and a 3% increase for students from other countries.

The board also approved changes to mandatory student fees at eight of the system's institutions. Among those eight, six institutions will see fee hikes ranging from \$5 to \$21 per semester, while two will lower their fees.

The Baldwin Bulletin asked Georgia College & State University about this decision and GCSU Interim Provost and Vice President for

Academic Affairs Dr. Holley Roberts said, "The decision by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia to maintain current tuition rates underscores our commitment to making higher education both accessible and affordable, without sacrificing

quality. "At Georgia College & State University, we recognize the critical balance between cost and return on investment. Our focus remains providing the kind of liberal arts education experience often associated with high-cost private colleges but offering that experience to students for the price of a public university with the goal of preparing students for a multitude of career options."
