BCSD announces new deputy superintendent

The Baldwin County School District hired Dr. Rodney Tyson, Sr. as its new deputy superintendent. Tyson will be working under the new Superintendent Dr. Kristina Brooks.

Tyson has over 18 years of experience in K-12 education serving in roles such as high school principal, alternative school principal, assistant principal and Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps director. Tyson was a commissioned officer in

the U.S. Army, so his introduction to the education field was through JROTC, where he took his leadership capabilities from his service and developed them to create new leaders.

"I started out as a classroom teacher as the JROTC director and began the program at Grovetown High School in Augusta. I did that for eight years and after that I became an assistant principal in high school and a high school principal before transitioning to the role prior to this one as principal of an alternative school," said Tyson.

Tyson saw the opportunity to work in Milledgeville through an online application on Teach Georgia. However, his first experience with the Baldwin County School District was during a visit as an assistant principal at a rival high school.

"We came down on a Friday night for a football game and I saw the outpour of community support. I told the principal at the time I was with that I did not believe we were in the right place because it looked more like a college

Georgia College & State University Director of Athletics Wendell Staton announced that baseball coach Nolan Belcher has stepped down to accept the University of North Georgia head coaching position.

"From my seat — and this is not hyperbole for me - Nolan Belcher is the best combination of baseball coach and person in the country," said Staton. "Nolan took our baseball program to even greater heights in every way possible. However, his impact on our program and our culture is much deeper than the outstanding record. Nolan is the culture carrier in the department. Nolan always puts the needs of the university and department ahead of his or the

Georgia Military College Prep School broke ground on its new 9,180 sq. ft. athletic complex, marking a major milestone for the school's athletic program. The ceremony, held at 330 S. City council held its second monthly meeting May 27 to discuss appointments to the planning and zoning board and a single ordinance and resolution.

City Manager Hank Griffeth

a photo of the letters, but I want to make sure the public is aware that it is a private company and the city does not endorse it."


Council heard the first reading of an ordinance amending the Land Development Code at 560 W. Martin Luther King Dr. The owner wishes to change zoning to

Seorgia college Georgia college GCSU baseball players named to ABCA All-Southeast first team

Georgia College & State University infielder Braeden Smith and starting pitcher Bradley Wilson were named to the American Baseball Coaches Association's NCAA Division II All-Southeast Region first team.

This is the first all-region nod for Smith this season and the third for Wilson, who was named to the first team by the Division II Conference Commissioners Association and the second team by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association. Smith, a sophomore first baseman from Statham, led the Bobcats in hitting (.379, 74-of-195), doubles (18), home runs (12), RBI (67), slugging percentage (.656), walks (49) and on-base percentage (.516) and was second in hits and run

scored (59). Smith is ranked 12th in NCAA Division II statistics in walks, 17th in walks per game (0.91), 24th in on-base percentage, 33rd in RBI, and 44th in RBI per game (1.24). Smith, who has 21 multi-hit and



Belcher guided a pitching staff that set a school-record with 468 strikeouts in 2018. During the two seasons, the Bobcats had four players drafted to Major League teams, five All-Americans and two Academic All-Americans. He coached a Region Pitcher of the Year and a PBC Pitcher of the Year as well.

A native of Augusta, winning has followed Belcher throughout his baseball career. He made three consecutive trips to the College World Series with the University of South Carolina, winning back-to-back national championships in 2010 and 2011 and finishing runner-up the following year. Belcher logged more than 250 innings over his career with the Gamecocks, making 38 starts while finishing his career with an 18-13 record and a 3.30 ERA. Belcher's successes include three state championships in his high school days spent at Greenbrier High and Augusta Christian in Augusta. Bobcats earn PBC Team Sportsmanship Award

The Peach Belt Conference has announced that Georgia College & State University has won the 2024-25 Men's Basketball Team Sportsmanship Award.

The PBC began its Team Sportsmanship Award program in the 2008-09 season. The program presents an award following each championship season to the team in that sport

that best exemplifies the spirit of sportsmanship and generally conducts itself with a high degree of integrity. character and class. The team award is selected by other teams who compete in that sport. Points are awarded based on how each team finished in the voting and in June, the institution with the highest totals will receive the PBC Institution of the

Year Sportsmanship Award.

GCSU won the men's basketball award for the fifth time in the last six years with its third in a row. The award is the 31st overall, second most among all PBC institutions, for the Bobcats athletics program.

The PBC senior woman administrators council oversees the program.

BHS earns 2024 platinum award for Greatest Gains in Student Achievement

Baldwin High School was awarded the 2024 Platinum Award for Greatest Gains by the Governor's Office of Student Achievement. This recognition places Baldwin High in the top 1% of all Georgia schools for academic growth over the past three years.

The Platinum Award represents the highest tier in the Single Statewide Accountability System and is given only to schools that demonstrate exceptional progress in student achievement. Baldwin High School is one of just 15 schools statewide to earn this

honor in 2024.

To receive the Platinum designation in the Greatest Gains category, schools must place in the 99th percentile or higher statewide in average College and Career-Ready Performance Index Progress Scores over the past three years, maintain a 2024 CCRPI score that is no more than 10 points lower than the 2019 score, and not appear on the GOSA 2024 Georgia **Promise Scholarship** Public School List or the Georgia Department of Education's 2024 CSI or TSI lists.

"This award is a

reflection of the collaborative effort of our students, teachers, administrators. and families," said Superintendent Dr. Noris Price. "It demonstrates the excellence we've worked so hard to cultivate in Baldwin County, and we could not be more proud."

Georgia WRD says 'Hey Georgians, Let's Get Gatorwise'

Georgia is home to an estimated population of around 225,000 alligators. So, no matter where you live, it's time to get GatorWise, says the Georgia Department of Natural Resources' Wildlife Resources Division.

"As the weather warms up and people are spending more time outdoors. it's a great time to remind everyone that it is normal to see alligators moving around and basking in rivers, ponds and lakes in the southern part of the state," said Kara Nitschke, WRD's state alligator biologist. "Alligators are native to Georgia and are critical to the health and balance of our ecosystems, so being GatorWise means

we know how to modify our behavior to minimize any potential conflict."

Learn the GatorWise basics:

- Alligators can live in any water body in their range. They are good at hiding and may be found in places where you have never seen them, especially after storms or floods. Keep your distance.
- Feeding alligators on purpose or by accident is illegal in Georgia. This can cause alligators to associate people with food and lose their natural fear of people.
- Throwing fish scraps in the water is one of the most common ways people

unintentionally feed alligators. Properly dispose of bait, fish scraps, and food items.

- Approaching, capturing or handling alligators puts you at risk. View and photograph alligators from a distance.
- Alligators do not know the difference between pets and prey. Keep pets on a leash and away from the water's edge. Supervise small children near the water.
- Observe alligator warning signs. Stay away from the water if you see an alligator. Avoid swimming in areas with dense vegetation and only swim during daylight hours.

GatorWise promotes realistic public perceptions about alligators and provides guidance on responsible human behavior to minimize conflict between people and alligators.

GatorWise was developed with cooperation from state fish and wildlife agencies of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Texas, all states within the range of the American Alligator.
